The GCL is an 18-mile passenger train that will cost taxpayers hundreds of dollars a year for only 18 miles? Why is it necessary? Glassboro to Camden is only 25 minutes away. There is no need for a high speed train for a 25 minute drive. The residential stops will put our children, who love playing outside at risk with every Stop. My grandchildren deserve better than train-related accidents and the higher crime index this GCL will bring. We will not stand for this.

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The Glassboro Camden Line Project is a railroad project that started with good intentions, but is now an openly hated idea by residents and taxpayers alike. The towns that are affected by this line are small residential towns in which the train will pass straight through developments; causing higher pollution, a blaring train every seven and a half minutes, and a lower safety index for multiple previously low crime neighborhoods. The residents and taxpayers of South Jersey strongly oppose the GCL for many reasons: the location of the light rail, the safety hazards it poses to our elderly, children, and pets, and the fact that it will be fully funded by taxing the people.

To begin, the GCL is scheduled to be constructed on the existing tracks running from Glassboro to Camden, connecting towns that are less than a half hour away by car, bus, or even biking. The majority of people of these towns have lived here their entire lives and they are aware and comfortable with their current methods of transportation, including the Rowan University staff and students. There is no desperate need for a light rail in this specific area. However, Route 55 was made with provisions to support a transportation line along the highway. According to an article by George Downing on NJ.com, "Most overpasses on Route 55 were built to accommodate a rail line under them". If the officials pushing for the GCL truly believe a light rail is what is best for the expansion of these towns and their people, perhaps they should take another look at alternative options besides a blaring train ripping through quiet towns every seven and a half minutes, disrupting the peaceful existence the townsfolk have created. Moving the light rail from these quiet neighborhoods to the overpasses of Route 55 would create less traffic on the highways, reduce noise, lights, and pollution complaints, keep property value high, and keep the people happy.

There is no doubt that any project focused on transportation expansion will come with safety risks. This is especially true about the Glassboro Camden Line. The crime percentage in Camden is significantly higher than that of any other New Jersey town, and EXPONENTIALLY higher than that of any town the GCL will pass through. The violent crime rate in Camden is currently 16.22%, while the average for the entire state of New Jersey is 2.08%, and the National Median for violent crime is only 4% according to NeighborhoodScout.com. It is extremely apparent that the way of life in Camden, NJ is inherently different than that of any other town in New Jersey, and now officials want to run a train directly from Camden to safe, unsuspecting, small residential areas that are full of innocent children, family pets, and senior citizens. This is an outrage to a large majority of residents that the GCL will affect. An increase in crime will especially affect the areas where boarding stations are built, including the station planned for construction in Sewell, at the intersection of Center Street and East Atlantic Avenue. This specific area has an abundance of children and the Station is already a bus stop for many of the youth in the immediate area. If a train is stopping every 15 minutes in this area, how will it be certain that the children will not be affected? The answer is just the opposite, it is certain that the rate of crimes and train track accidents against children will increase due to the location of the GCL. This project is being constructed to make the state a decent profit, but is that worth risking the livelihood of the children and the people?

The Glassboro Camden Line is a large project that will take years to complete and millions of dollars. A project that is unnecessary, unwanted, and downright disruptive. But at least the federal government will be responsible for collecting the funds, right? Wrong. According to an article on Nj.com, "The Federal Transportation Agency ruled this project [GCL] economically unfeasible to qualify for federal mass transport funding...". Meaning that the Federal Government believes this project to be inconvenient and impractical, yet New Jersey officials pushed forward anyway, fully aware and content with taxing the people of New Jersey over 20 million dollars a year. This issue does not only impact the residents where the GCL will pass through, but also North Jersey residents as well. The entire proposal for the GCL came at the most trying times, when the affects of the COVID-19 pandemic are in full blast and citizens are already dealing with the devastating hits of this virus. It seems extremely unethical to add the weight of hundreds and thousands of tax dollars to the already struggling people.

In Conclusion, the Glassboro Camden line is an unnecessary and economically unfeasible headache for every New Jersey citizen it affects, and only benefits the pockets of the officials attempting to bring it to life. The people of New Jersey will not stand for this new light rail due to its poor location choice, effect on safety, and inconceivable costs. We WILL stand together and shout "NO NO NO TRAIN" to anyone that can hear us. We urge you to strongly consider our viewpoints and put a stop to this community destroying project before it is too late.

Environmental Impact Statement

I am writing concerning the negative environmental impact to the Borough of Woodbury Heights from the GCL.

Woodbury Heights is divided in half by the train tracks. So to add a speed line train every 30 minutes would stop emergency vehicles such as police, fire and ambulance from quick access to residents. Also our school has walkers to three schools in our community. We have a crossing guard at Elm and West Jersey Ave that would now have to safely cross children over railroad tracks.

The new Master Plan includes a housing project and train station and now train yard to be added to our small 1.5 square mile community. These changes would drastically impact our small community in a negative manner. The need for more police services and resources would negatively impact the taxpayers, who already have one of the highest tax rates in Gloucester County.

The Borough Hall and public grade school is located directly beside the railroad tracks. The train traffic would cause a major distraction to both students, teachers and Borough workers and meetings.
